There are two different audio tours—not everyone is doing the same one. Complete the **note-taking guide on the back of this handout.**
- #3. Once you have reached the END point of your tour, answer the following questions on a separate piece of paper in [target language]:
 - 1. Did you enjoy this audio tour? Why or why not? Be specific.
 - **2.** What new things did you learn?
 - **3.** Did you see any new places? Which ones?
 - **4.** What was most interesting to you and why?
 - 5. Pick your favorite place or part of the tour and describe it in detail, including as much information from the audio guide as possible but also adding your own ideas and information.
- #4. Bring your answers to the above questions and this worksheet to class. With your partner, find another pair who completed a **different** audio tour than you did.
- #5. Have a group discussion about your audio tours. You can use the answers to your questions as a guide, but try to **make it a discussion**—not just reading your answers. What places did you see, and in what order? What did you learn? What did you all ready know? What was most interesting?
